

So far Term 4 has been really great for us in Chaucer 9 and we have been very active in many ways. The team from Circability has been keeping us "on our toes" for the last term and a bit. We are learning how to balance a bean bag on different parts of our bodies and how to keep a spinning plate balanced and moving.

We have also started to go on community outings to Craigavon Park this term and we have had an amazing time exploring the big playground and the water play area. We are also looking forward to visiting the new playground at Base School sometime soon! It's been so rewarding to head out as a class to explore fun activities in our community.



Other sections of the school - Outreach

One of the many things that our school provides is the Specialist Teacher Outreach Service (S.T.O.S). This enables us to support O.R.S (Ongoing Resourcing Scheme) students in mainstream schools in our local area, and is a valuable service to build inclusive practices. We have eight specialists, who are all highly experienced teachers, who help classroom teachers and teacher aides to develop and deliver bespoke programmes for our students.

During my first term at Oaklynn I was able to connect with each of the eighteen schools that we support and every one of them spoke highly of the professionalism and knowledge that our specialist team bring to their students. They spoke of supporting not only individual teachers, but of upskilling the whole school with staff meetings and workshops around such areas as A.S.D (Autism Spectrum Disorder), adapting the curriculum and developing effective I.E.Ps (Individual Education Plans). We are so proud of our outreach team and the work that they do.

Not only do the team connect with local schools, they are also full members of our Oaklynn school team, taking part in the activities and professional development that takes place in the wider school. This enables us to update and refresh our practice, link in with the therapy teams, and take part in all that makes Oaklynn - 'Oaklynn'.

Some of our specialist team have additional responsibilities within the school too, most notably with school-wide P.E (physical education), C.O.E.S (Centre of Extra Support), i.C.o.L (Internal Community of Learning) work and in developing the school curriculum. As you can see, their knowledge is broad and their passions serve to upskill and support Base school and our satellite settings as well.

Not all mainstream schools make use of our service, so if you know of a family with an O.R.S student who you think may need some additional support beyond their own school, do let us know and we will see what we can do to help.
