## A few words from our Acting Principal Pilar

Kia ora koutou,

Welcome to Term 4! Perhaps the busier term of the year but also full of fun and celebrations. We have started the term with a very busy schedule with our ERO (Educational Review Office) partners visiting our school last week. This is the start of a longer process over three years, whereby an ERO representative will be working alongside us as we continue to strengthen processes and outcomes. The ERO team enjoyed meeting senior leaders, board of trustees, staff and ākonga. With the highlight of the (initial) visit to us last week, being the trips out to classes to see our ākonga and staff in action.

This is the term whereby we look toward student placements for the following year. This means that learners will start the process of transition to classes for 2024. If your rangitahi is transitioning to another classroom for 2024 you will receive a call - explaining the process within this year, and to start 2024. These transitions can initially create a little anxiety for ākonga and whānau. For this reason, we work to provide the right support and resources to make these transitions as smooth as possible, so that when we come back after the summer break - your young person is familiarised with the setting, staff and their new peers.

We look forward to a successful Term 4.

And finally, we recently had the opportunity to meet with Marise Bergmann and Denise West from Cross Country Rentals as well as some of our taxi drivers, with a Ministry representative present, to do some professional development for them in regards to transporting our ākonga. This was a positive step for us and our drivers. Some drivers have been with us for years and are familiar with our students, while others are very new to driving our ākonga. A BIG thank you to our Occupational Therapists - Tripti, Kylie and Olivia for being the 'drivers' of this training, and we hope to continue this mahi in the future.
