Within this term, Te Aratika students have had a chance to be "freshwater detectives". To support us to do so, we were lucky enough to have Kathryn from Watercare come and visit us, to tell us about all the different tests they do on freshwater (turbidity, acidity, nitrate levels and the different insects found in

streams). We also got to experiment with some of the different test kits in class, and then we walked to our local stream (at La Rosa Park) to test the water there. There was a lot of thinking done; as we had all different experiment instructions to remember and work through, and we had to interpret the results (and what such results meant about our local stream). Our ākonga did an amazing job of applying and managing themselves throughout the La Rosa Park mahi - well done!

The Gardening To Table kaupapa is one of our most calming curriculum activities at Base school. Ākonga and kaiako alike enjoy feeling the earth between our fingers and tending to our precious crops as they grow.
